Also appearing in this collection is a never-before-published gem by David Lindsay, author of *Voyage to Arcturus*, a novel which Tolkien praised highly both as a thriller and as a work of philosophy, religion, and morals. In stories packed with magical journeys, conflicted heroes, and terrible beasts, this extraordinary volume is one that no fan of fantasy or Tolkien should be without.
