**Army Techniques Publication ATP 4-02.2 Medical Evacuation July 2019 Oct 20 2021** This manual, *Army Techniques Publication ATP 4-02.2 Medical Evacuation July 2019*, provides doctrine and techniques for conducting medical evacuation and medical regulating operations. Medical evacuation encompasses both the evacuation of Soldiers from the point of injury or wounding to a medical treatment facility staffed and equipped to provide essential care in theater and further evacuation from the theater to provide definitive, rehabilitative, and convalescent care in the continental United States and the movement of patients between medical treatment facilities or to staging facilities. Medical evacuation entails the movement of patients on dedicated ground and air ambulances, medically staffed and equipped to provide en route medical care; supports the military health system; and links the continuum of care. In addition, it discusses the difference between medical evacuation and casualty evacuation as well as coordination requirements for and the use of nonmedical transportation assets to accomplish the casualty evacuation mission. The principal audience for this publication is all commanders and their staffs, command surgeons, Army health systems planners, Army Medical Department personnel and units involved in medical evacuation operations. The Army Health System is a complex system of interrelated and interdependent systems which provides a continuum of medical treatment from the point of injury or wounding through successive roles of medical care to definitive, rehabilitative, and convalescent care in the continental United States, as required. Medical evacuation is the system which provides the vital linkage between the roles of care necessary to sustain the patient during transport. This is accomplished by providing en route medical care and emergency medical intervention, if required, to enhance the individual's prognosis and reduce long-term disability. *Army Techniques Publication 4-02.2* contains six chapters and four appendices as follows: Chapter 1 provides an overview of Army Health System and how medical evacuation relates to the principles of the Army Health System. It discusses the purpose, primary tasks, and attributes of the Army medical evacuation system. It also defines the differences between medical evacuation and casualty evacuation. Chapter 2 discusses the employment of medical evacuation resources and the coordination and synchronization

required to effectively execute medical evacuation operations. This includes the medical evacuation request process, consideration for evacuation missions, support planning considerations, and evacuation in specific environments. Chapter 3 describes the mission, function and capabilities of medical evacuation units and elements as specified in the unit's table of organization and equipment. It also discusses the mission command headquarters to which they are assigned. Chapter 4 discusses the factors that establish the evacuation policy and the impact of the evacuation policy on Army Health System support. Chapter 5 provides insight and considerations into developing the operational and tactical medical evacuation plan that supports the combatant commander's mission. Chapter 6 describes the medical regulating system designed to ensure the efficient and safe movement of regulated patients to the appropriate military treatment facility by the most effective means. It also discusses the multi-Service responsibility and assets used to conduct this mission. Appendix A provides a summary of the Geneva Conventions and The Law of War. Appendix B provides an example of a medical evacuation plan as part of an operations order. Appendix C provides an example of the 9-line medical evacuation request format. Appendix D provides examples of medical evacuation during operations to shape, prevent, large-scale combat operations, and to consolidate gains.

**Army Regulation AR 600-85 The Army Substance Abuse Program July 2020 Aug 30 2022** This United States Army manual, Army Regulation AR 600-85 The Army Substance Abuse Program July 2020, provides comprehensive alcohol- and drug-abuse prevention and control policies, procedures, and responsibilities for Soldiers of all components, DA Civilians, and other personnel eligible for Army Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) services. The comprehensive program is composed of integrated functions that include deterrence, drug testing, prevention and training, and substance use disorder (SUD) treatment. The Deputy Chief of Staff (DCS), G-1, Army Resilience Directorate (ARD) develops ASAP goals and policies, and directs ASAP operations. The ASAP's, deterrence, drug testing, and prevention and training are part of Installation Management Command (IMCOM), Army Material Command (AMC), Army National Guard (ARNG), and the U.S. Army Reserve (USAR) functional missions. The clinical care functional responsibility is referred to as Substance Use Disorder Clinical Care (SUDCC) and is integrated within the Behavioral Health System of Care (BHSOC). This regulation governs the Army Substance Abuse Program. It identifies Army policy on alcohol and other drug abuse, and it identifies assigned responsibilities for implementing the program. This regulation applies to the Regular Army, the Army National Guard/Army National Guard of the United States when in Title 10 status (National Guard in Title 32 status should refer to chapter 15), U.S. Army Reserve, and Department of the Army civilian employees. Chapter 15 applies specifically to the Army National Guard of the United States, while chapter 16 applies to the U.S. Army Reserve. However, other chapters of the regulation apply to Soldiers of the U.S. Army Reserve and the Army National Guard, when indicated. Chapter 5 applies to Department of the Army civilian employees. Chapter 6 applies to Department of the Army civilian employees, Family members, and military retirees.

**The Antigonid Army Mar 25 2022** This book deals with the Macedonian army under the Antigonid dynasty, who ruled Macedon from 294 BC until 168 BC. The representational evidence is mainly dealt with in the first two chapters. Chapter 1 deals with the Tomb of Lyson and Kallikles, and Chapter 2 with the survival of some Antigonid Court art in Roman copies. The rest of the book deals with the literary and epigraphic material relating to the army. Chapter 3 deals with Army Command and Staff, Chapter 4 with the Cavalry, Chapter 5 with Infantry Equipment and Chapter 6 with Infantry Organization. Chapter 7 deals with the Mobilization of the army, and so, necessarily with the way the kingdom of Macedonia was organized. The final Chapter 8 is concerned with the evidence for the leukaspides phalanx in the Antigonid army. The leukaspides are only mentioned twice in an Antigonid context, at the battles of Sellasia and Pydna, and the author reaches the controversial conclusion is that the references refer to allied forces of thureophoroi during the two battles. In the course of this chapter the author attempts a new reconstruction of the battle of Pydna. The book neither deals with artillery nor naval matters.
