Thomas Reid: Ethics, Aesthetics and the Anatomy of the Self Jan 29 2020 I: BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF REID Thomas Reid (1710-96) was born at Strachan in Kincardineshire, Scotland, not far from Aberdeen. Reid was fortunate in his family connections. For instance his mother's brother was David Gregory, Savilian professor of Astronomy at Oxford and close friend of Sir Isaac Newton. Reid entered Marischal College, Aberdeen, at the age of twelve after the usual spell in Aberdeen Grammar School. After a short period as college librarian he married his cousin Margaret Gregory, having gained the position of (Presbyterian) minister at New Machar, in the gift of King's College, Aberdeen, which he held from 1737 till 1752. Although Reid published only one paper, An Essay on Quantity, in this period he was far from intellectually idle; for one thing he familiarised himself with the works of Bishop Butler, especially The Analogy of Religion, which, together with those of Samuel Clarke and Isaac Newton, were to have a profound influence on his mature philosophy. In 1752 Reid was appointed a regent at King's College, Aberdeen. During his regency he not only founded a crucially important discussion group, 'The Wise Club', and familiarised himself with David Hume's A Treatise of Human Nature both through his own reading and by exhaustive discussion of it within the group; he also wrote extensively. He composed and delivered his seminal Latin Philosophical Orations.

Raphael (*The Moral Sense*) and his entire philosophical position by S. A. Grave (*The Scottish Philosophy of Common Sense*). Prior to both, A. D. Woozley gave us the first modern reprint of Reid's *Essays on the Intellectual Powers of Man* - in fact the first edition of any work by Reid to appear in print since the *Philosophical Works* was edited in the nineteenth century by Sir William Hamilton. But Reid's aesthetic philosophy has not received its due. Woozley, in abridging the *Essays*, omitted the whole final essay, "On Taste," which is the only extended work on aesthetic theory that Reid ever published. And Grave, although he did present a short and very cogent resume of Reid's aesthetic position, obviously found himself drawn to other elements of Reid's philosophy. There are, of course, some accounts of Reid's aesthetic theory to be found in the various studies of eighteenth-century British aesthetics and criticism. None, however, appears to me to do any kind of justice to the philosophical questions which Reid treats in his aesthetics and philosophy of art.
